

Over this summer at MIT I learned skills I'll carry with me forever. I built a network of contacts to call on in the years to come as I travel along this journey of entrepreneurship. I had the opportunity to work with Harvard law professors, MBAs and people who have been working in the Silicon Valley for over twenty years.

Over the four weeks at the launch I made two real companies. The first company I made is Edibo. It is a peer to peer platform that allows college student cooks to sell their homemade food they make for themselves to the local community. In these four weeks we had our final application ready. We ran trials with over 25 real college students and 5 cooks who were our beachhead personas. We talked to lawyers working in this industry and ensured that the legal paperwork was ready before the launch. We have 2000 beta signups as of now.

The second company I was invited to join is Swap. It allows users to instantly and simultaneously add each other on all social media, along with phone numbers and emails, with the scan of a QR code.

At the end of the program I won three awards and was invited to the world's biggest entrepreneurship conference which takes place in Harvard to present my idea and meet investors.
