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
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As we close a chapter of our lives and welcome the new year, we bring to you another page-turner with The Shishukunj Gazette!






1970s: Disco Funk

ion was never intended to make anyone feelweak but everyone powerful.


2020s: Breaking Barriers of



Popular music was equally impacted by these forces and as home radios became more common, the music industry began to keep track of and measure the popularity of sheet music and records through sales. Musical films were an important part of popular music during the 1930s, offering a brief reprieve from the grim reality of the Great Depression and were an easy and affordable means of entertainment. These films opened a door to the glamorous world of Hollywood, showcasing song and dance numbers in front of a stylish background.

1940s: The Sound of World War II

The 1940s sound mostly consisted of powerful ballads about lovers reuniting after the war and old-fashioned battle marches. One of the most famous songs of the decade was "There'll Be Bluebirds Over the White Cliffs of Dover" which talked about peace and hopeful future after the war.

This decade also saw the rise of genres like Latin Pop, Country and other patriotic hits boomed through fallen spirits of the war.




1950s: Civil Rights or Civil Rock n' Roll?

The coming of rock and roll in the 50s was not merely a musical revolution but a social upheaval of unpredictable scope. Rhythm & Blues (R&B) and Rock 'n' Roll popularized "black" music and many African-American musicians rose to prominence and enjoyed success, but while some were able to reap the benefits of their work, many others were forgotten or denied access to audiences through segregation. Others believe that the popularization of R&B and Rock 'n' Roll only helped to bridge the gap between blacks and whites and further the civil rights movement. Elvis Presley, Chuck Berry and Johnny Cash were the music everyone was listening to and set the precedent for generations to come.

1960s: The Summer of Love

The 1960s is generally considered the greatest decade of music. The assassination of President Kennedy, the escalation of the war in Vietnam and the forward-progress of the Civil Rights Movement all greatly impacted the mood of American culture and the music began to reflect that change. The "British Invasion" also began around 1963 with the arrival of The Beatles on the music scene and the type of rabid fandom that followed them would change the way people would view and interact with music and musicians forever.

Set against this backdrop of one the most tumultuous times in history, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Aretha Franklin provided the music of this decade. The folk and psychedelic sound was inspired by the disillusioned youth. The Woodstock music festival in 1969 became a cultural touchstone as half a million people lived there for days, sharing food and shelter and were protesting the Vietnam war. The song "Times They Are-a Changing" written by Bob Dylan also became an anthem for the ongoing African American Civil Rights movement.

1970s: The Disco Movement

Taking on the sound of disco, funk, soul and rock, the 1970s created a perfect musical bridge from the rebelliousness of the 1960s and the happy songs that are characteristic of the 1980s. Following the counterculture of the 60s, the 70s created a trend of relaxing music as well as dance music. "What's Going On" by Marvin Gaye which was inspired by seeing the police attack anti-war protestors perfectly captured the unease at the beginning of the decade while the song "Imagine" by John Lennon about peace was a genre defining global hit whose legacy is still carried on today. The latter half of the decade marked a happier sound with ABBA, Elton John and the Bee Gees brought dancing with the disco craze.

1980s: There's Something For Everybody

The 80s did everything. They balanced the new wave, the growing punk sound, futuristic synth sound all while remaining to be one of the most colourful decades.

Music in the 1980s was all about image and with the advent and popularity of MTV, the images that accompanied artists became more important than ever. When it came to music during the decade, nothing was understated, not the sound, not the fashion, not even the charity. The 1980s reflected the beginning of a period of great income disparity and a focus on affluence was reflected in the music. There were also several new genres that popped up including, Hip Hop, New Wave and Hair Metal, all of which have influenced music today.







Led Zeppelin, Micheal Jackson, David Bowie and Prince all dominated charts. Queen song "Break Free" also became a queer anthem throughout the nation. "Black and White" by Micheal Jackson spurred change against racism. On 13 July, 1985 one of the biggest concerts in history was held at the Wembley Stadium. The Live Aid was a 16-hour globally telecasted concert that helped raise 127 million dollars for famine in Africa.



1990s: Girls, Spice and All Things Nice



The 90s are usually considered an apolitical bubble in time, people discussed Britney Spears' love life more than they did with politics but there still were a lot of social consciousness brought on by music. Rage Against the Machine's "Killing in The Name" talked about police brutality and institutionalised racism. While, Spice Girls' "Wannabe" and Destiny's Child's "Survivor" celebrated female power and embraced third wave feminism.

2000s: Hello? 9/11?

The 2000s was a historically confusing time for both music and people. Against the backdrop of the horrors of 9/11 and the 2007-2008 financial crisis, the 00s saw the post-punk revival among teens alongside emo music.

Hip-hop became mainstream, and elevated black-storytelling with Nas, Jay-z, Kanye West, Snoop Dog taking centre stage. "Never Let Me Down" by Kanye West and Jay-z talked about racism as Emimen shot to success as well.









Even though in-person schools have been opened, not everything is the same. From the lunch hall chaos to our beloved school functions, there's a lot to miss!

Our team took a short survey on some of these beloved things we missed and the fun times we had even during our online classes. With the gathered responses of almost 200*^ students, here are the results!


Favourite School Meal

AND ITS RELEVANCE TÓDAY

George Orwell's evocative and captivating book- I984, is a warning against totalitarianism wrapped in a chilling dystopia. The book is a depiction of a state where thinking differently results in torture, where people are under surveillance every second of the day, and party propaganda trumps free speech.

It leaves a perpetual impact on its readers such that it's almost impossible to read this book without relating it to current circumstances or to be reminded of it each time you read ever sprouting news of state censorship, authoritarianism or notice the use of doublespeak prevalent in the media.




It is not unusual for debates about propaganda, surveillance, authoritarian politics, or perversions of truth to drop a reference to 1984. It is perhaps so because this book puts into simple words common enigmas of the political landscape which we encounter almost everyday. For example, in the book, "doublespeak" is the obscuring, disguising or distorting of the meaning of a word. It can very easily be observed in the Indian political arena where people are quick to label others "anti-national" or "bhakts" to detach opinions or sometimes even facts, not by logical debate but by simply discrediting the information and very often the person expressing it as well.

More extreme examples of state censorship related to technology and totalitarianism can be observed in Saudi Arabia and China.

Saudi Arabia- an episode of a Netflix Series called Patriot Act which discussed the involvement of the crown prince Mohammad Bin Salman in the killing of Washington Post journalist, Jamal Khashoggi was removed from streaming in the country.

The people of China observe a draconian system of censorship where Youtube, Facebook, Netflix and most other common applications are banned.



The people are only allowed to use a few government approved censored applications and significant pieces of history like Tiananmen Square (thousands of demonstrators protesting the government gathered at Tiananmen Square were open fired on by the government) fail to find a place in Chinese history books. The government is truly in control of the information. Or as George Orwell aptly put it in 1984 - Who controls the past controls future; who controls the present controls the past.

Though no government has been able to or possibly will be able to have as much control as Big Brother has in the book, we do not have to look far from home to find resemblances to it.

The recent news of the alleged Pegasus leak (possible government surveillance of the people) which came as a shocking revelation and was discussed and debated at length by people, reciting what they think about it, which coincidentally ran parallel to what their respective news sources thought about it of course, now stands forgotten by This most citizens. predicament truly animates some of the phrases "I984" like- Big Brother is always watching, Thought Police and Thought Crime.

of course, the government controlled media and punishment for "thoughtcrime" has never been so conspicuously evident as today, cases of journalists. activists and comedians that have been locked up and/ or died in jail occur frequently but sadly do not nearly as frequently headlines.

The case of the forgotten student activists about to complete a year in jail under prevention and suspect but with no crime proved in court screams of Unperson, Thought Crime and Room IOI.

George Orwell lived through and fought in the World War prior to writing this book, it was also the time where the world stood divided by the Iron Curtain. Many believe that the book is simply against communism because it talks of a socialist state but it is truly a warning against any* form totalitarianism. and an effective one at that. It can be interpreted many ways, it is this endedness that makes it a rare case of a very political book that is a favourite among irrespective of their inclination. The book, written in 1949 is not a prediction but a stark, cynical and haunting glimpse to what could be.






I want you to know

mirrorball, the sixth track off of Taylor Swift's eighth album, folklore explores the repercussions of wearing a facade around others to please them and losing oneself in the process. The dictionary definition states that a mirrorball is 'a revolving ball covered with small mirrored facets, used to provide lighting effects at discos or dances.' Here, Swift draws parallels between the fragile mirrors that concoct a merry vibrancy and a veil worn for the recreation of others, both of which when broken into a million pieces can make no difference at all and a mountain of difference at the same time.

The shattering of the mirrorball has another connotation- the breaking of hearts. In this way, it sheds light on the existence of such people whose brokenness is what makes them shiny, and it is what gathers the scrutiny of the paparazzi and makes subsequent bold headlines in distinguished newspapers.



Swift underlines the fact that she is the best version of herself when she is alone, without having to worry about the perceptions and satisfaction of others. The pretty wrapping paper needs to be torn to unveil the precious present inside. Acknowledging her people-pleasing nature, she attempts to keep the others in the shadow of her true self.

Now comparing herself to other entities of entertainment, namely circus animals and rodeo clowns, Swift describes the extent to which she can shapeshift in order to keep the illusion effectual. The tightrope and the trapeze depict the extremity of consciousness and signify her efforts to impress others. She is still stuck on being a charmer. She has never been a 'natural,' meaning that she has downright lost her individuality in the continuous process of restructuring herself. After the performers have left, the arena has been abandoned and the disco has gone up in flames, she is the only one standing there, persistently doing her utmost to keep the show going.

In all its vulnerability, this lyrical masterpiece points to the duplicitous nature exhibited by everyone- a different version around different kinds of people. "I'll show you every version of yourself tonight" refers to the reflective ability of the mirrorball; the multifaceted sphere can bring out these distinct characteristics in the surrounding individualsthe best as well as the worst. Acting in ways desired by the society stays put in the centre foreground while the theme of the malignancy of a relationship lingers in the background. "I'm still trying everything to get you laughing at me" is an allusion to the fact that she can sink to inglorious and exhausting levels to desperately try and catch the eyes of her partner. The song, therefore, serves as a subtle reminder to not misplace our originality in the labyrinth of 'trying to figure it all out'.


THE WARMTH OF
