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

The World of Computers

When you look around yourself, hunks of metal and plastic being used by nearly everyone come into visibility. Some look at it and smile, others hold it near their ears as they speak, some are furiously mashing buttons on what seems to be a bunch of letters while looking at a screen. As we know, all of these objects are computers, and in this club, we explore all the different fields and components of everything that is computers. Not only do we deal with programming, but different types of hardware, software, history— all with one important goal in mind: Practical Application.

This session, we started with the programming module wherein the students were given the opportunity to either learn Python Programming or Web Development. In the Python group, students learned the basics of Python which included learning about Python Variables, Strings, Dictionaries, etc.

The Web Development group started their Web Development (or as geeks call it "WebDev") journey by learning HTML and CSS which enabled them to create simple web pages.

Apart from this, the club conducted different competitions and discussions. The discussion ranged from Cyberserutiy and Cyber Warfare, Electric Vehicles and their Future in India to Robotics and Tech in Shark Tank India. Some competitions which were organised were:

- 2. Problem Solving Event in which club members had to solve real life problems using computer science and technology.

- 3. Select Time & Language
- 4. Select Language & Region
- 5.Choose 'Hindi' from the Windows display language menu, or next to Preferred languages select Add a language to install it if it already wasn't.

Thomas Sankara

reaking the shackles of imperialist hegemony, Thomas Sankara led the revolution in Burkina Faso for good. Seeking wisdom from socialist

philosopher, Karl Marx, and military strategy, he mustered up the courage to call out the government led by Jean-Baptiste Ouedraogo. Moreover, Sankara made his way into the administration, orating, forming alliances with neighbouring countries on the shared legacy of colonialism. But his socialist beliefs were no pleasure to Jean-Baptiste and his colleagues, and as a result, he was placed on house arrest.

These adversities did not affect Thomas's ideas and dreams, rather they made him stronger than ever. On August 4, 1983, Thomas Sankara became the new president of Burkina Faso. Sankara launched his ambitious programs. He always thought that racial, gender, ecological, epistemic, food, and economic justice were intrinsically connected. He believed revolutionary projects were necessarily holistic, considering that imperialism ends.

His foreign policies were centred on anti-imperialism, with his government eschewing all foreign aid, debt reduction, nationalising all land and mineral wealth, and averting the power and influence of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and World Bank. His domestic policies were focused on preventing famine with agrarian self-sufficiency and land reform, prioritising education with a nationwide literacy campaign, and promoting public health by vaccinating 2.5 million children against meningitis, yellow fever, and measles.

Other components of his national agenda included planting over ten million trees to halt the growing desertification of the Sahel, doubling wheat production by redistributing land from feudal landlords to peasants, suspending rural poll taxes and domestic rents, and establishing an ambitious road and rail construction program to "tie the nation together."

There were various strands to Sankara's approach to foreign affairs. Officially, he considered the revolution in Burkina Faso as 'part of the world movement for peace and democracy, against imperialism and all forms of hegemonism'. He called for 'mutual non-aggression', 'non-interference in domestic affairs', fairness in trade and for respecting 'each other's independence, territorial integrity, and national sovereignty'. A committed Pan-African, he supported national liberation movements around the world and was devoted to the anti-apartheid struggle. Sankara also advocated for debt non-repayment and disarmament and was far ahead of his times on environmental issues.

From his experience as a revolutionary leader and convinced of the need for a Marxist-Leninist understanding of human society, Sankara explained the origins of women's oppression and the importance to eradicate it.



A Magnifying Glass to The World of Science

INTRODUCTION

Anveshika, the Maths and Science club, thrives on curiosity. The motto of the club is to make STEM subjects more engaging by using handson activities and experiential learning, and we are all driven by a passion to know why things are the way they are. also actively Anveshika promotes the scientific method and encourages its members to adopt it as a part of their lifestyles.



THE CONCEPT

Whilst Pythagoras, the 6th century BC Greek philosopher, is foremost known for his mathematical innovations, such as his study of the property of numbers and his well-known geometric theorem that relates the sides of a right triangle in a simple way, not many people know he was also an accomplished inventor.

One of his many inventions is the Pythagorean cup, also known as the greedy cup — a clever and entertaining vessel designed to hold an optimal amount of wine, forcing people to imbibe only in moderation — a virtue of great regard among ancient Greeks.

If the user was too greedy and poured wine over the designed threshold, the cup would spill its entire content. Imagine the dismay and stupefaction a glutton felt when his precious brew perished on the floor.

STEP BY STEP PROCESS

Cut the end of the straw nearest the bend at a 45°.
Then, cut the tipoff of the pointy side.




Bend the straw

Using the pushpin, make a small hole in the centre of the bottom of one of the plastic cups. Then, widen it using your scissors. The straw should just fit in the hole.



Push the straw
through the cup so
that the bendy end of
the straw is inside the
cup. Then, hot glue
the flat end of the
bendy side of the
straw to the bottom
of the plastic cup



Turn the cup
upside down and
seal the space
around the straw
with hot glue.



Place the clear plastic cup lid on top of the second cup.



Then, carefully place the first plastic cup on top of the lid so that the straw goes through the hole in the lid.



Now you are ready to experiment with your Pythagoras cup! Fill the third plastic cup with water and begin to pour it into the top cup. What happens if you fill the cup below the straw? What happens if you fill the cup above the straw?



HOW DOES IT WORK?

The Pythagoras cup is a fun example of a syphon, a device that uses gravity to drain a container of liquid. As the cup is filled with water, the short end of the straw starts to fill up, reaching the same height as the water in the cup. Once that water level reaches the bend at the top of the straw, some of the water begins to drain down the long end of the straw due to the pull of gravity. At this point, the straw begins to act like a syphon: the draining water in the long end of the straw creates an area of low pressure at the bend in the straw. The weight of the water in the cup can now push more water into the straw, and this water rushes towards the low-pressure area, up and over the bend in the straw and out of the bottom of the cup. Once this cycle has begun, the syphon will actually drain out all of the water in the cup.

The Pythagoras cup will work like a regular cup as long as it isn't filled to its brim, but if a greedy person over-fills the cup, the syphon kicks into action and spills the entire contents of the cup onto the drinker.

What was something you found very challenging in this unusual MUN and could you overcome it?

What experience did you find best during your last Shishukunj MUN?

It's difficult to pinpoint one particular being the Secretaryexperience during General. However, conference, I remember that 5 minutes after Mrs. Khanna's message to the group, the entire team assembled together in one of the rooms in the CCA Block- all so busy and determined to improve the quality of the conference. That was the first time I'd seen the entirety of the team at one place because all the past meetings had been conducted online due to the Covid restrictions and it somehow made the entire experience better.

What was one thing that you had expected wouldn't be possible over an online MUN but it actually became possible?

Actually, there were two things- the participation of the students and the commendable interaction maintained by the office-bearers. We did not know how much to expect from a virtual intra-school MUN but the number of enrollments received for we participation as delegates was a lot more than what we had thought it would be. We had to make separate committees for the juniors. Secondly, we did not get even one negative feedback from any of the delegates in any of the committees which was for the first time that this happened. It was a pleasant surprise.

We had to create an extra committee and the number of highly experienced MUNners was low in our batch and our immediate junior batch.

So we had to be really thoughtful and conscious in selecting the office bearers and giving them positions. That was difficult as all the applicants had the same experience and allotting them posts, dividing them into committees, and working with them was a bit challenging. But I would say that it would not have been possible without the USGs because Eesha and I had to do the least work and interaction with the office bearers—our problems were diminished to, like, 1% of how it would've been otherwise.



What was your reaction when you were permitted to call the secretariat, bureau, international press and crisis staff to school for the MUN?



Here's a yummy and easy recipe on how to make fudge. We tried to make it in our club sessions for Swaad, and were met with immediate success as everyone devoured the fudges they made. We hope you make a fudge that melts in your mouth but stays in your heart!

Ingredients:

- 1) Compound chocolate (dark or milk) 350 gm/2 cups
- 2) Condensed milk 1 can/ 400 gm
- 3) Butter 2 tablespoons
- 4) Any topping of choice (Optional), e.g, almonds, walnuts, M&M's, etc. 1/4 cup

Note: If you do not want your fudge to be too sweet or too bitter—use 1 cup of dark chocolate and 1 cup of milk chocolate.

Instructions:

- Grease your pan and set it aside
- Melt your chocolate
- Add condensed milk and melted butter
- If you want some crunch, add in walnuts or any topping of your choice
- Pour the fudge mixture into the prepared pan
- Refrigerate this for 3-4 hours or until completely set
- Cut into squares
- Dust some cocoa powder or powdered sugar on top











































1) As a primarily online functioning student council, what were some challenges that you faced in regards to the working and output on the team as a whole?

We had to maintain the standards of our school while conducting activities that require some offline touch. Even though there was a bit of a compromise, we had a lot of fun in the online meetings. Communication with the management was very efficient too.

Nirali - The biggest setback of the online mode was to scrape off some activities from the list that the school had been conducting for years. For example, inter-house quizzes and wall magazines couldn't be conducted so symbol making competition was organised instead.

Suhani - I feel like we have missed a lot in terms of connecting with the Didis and Bhaiyas of our school. I wish we could spend a lot more time with the school authorities while working with them. But as far as the council goes, all of us have come very close.




The Self Portrait

This painting was painted only months before his death in 1889. The background reminds us of the rhythms of The Starry Night, which the portrait resembles also in the dominating bluish tone of the work. It is a surly, almost rude and choleric face - as if the sitter had had enough of examining his features for signs of madness. This self-portrait was one of about 32 produced over a 10-year period, and these were an important part of his work as a painter. He painted himself because he often lacked the money to pay for models. He has used short and rough brush strokes here.



Café Terrace at Night



Painted in 1888, this oil painting of a colourful outdoor view is a picturesque work, the vision of a relaxed spectator who enjoys the charm of his surroundings without any moral concern. It recalls Van Gogh's mood when he wrote that "the night is more alive and more richly colored than the day." The colour is more profuse and the eye wanders along the steeped or dove-tailed edges of neighbouring areas - irregular shapes fitted to each other like a jigsaw puzzle design. Analysis about the colours used- This is a night painting without black, with nothing but beautiful blue and violet and green and in this surrounding the illuminated area colours itself sulphur pale yellow and citron green.



Almond Blossom, poised between lucidity and desperation, this lacework of light and colour is kept aloft by the confidence Van Gogh had acquired in the previous two or three years and the sheer technical finesse now at his command. In the openness and buoyancy of the design, we sense the optimism that the artist - despite his insurmountable condition - could magnificently translate into paint.

It was Van Gogh's gift to his newly born nephew and namesake.



Six of Crows by Leigh Bardugo

'Kaz Brekker didn't need a reason.'

From the start of the book with this specific quote, till the very end of this toe-curling ride, Leigh Bardugo has proved time and again that Kaz Brekker did nothing without a reason. He's feared by Ketterdam's underworld, greed and cruelty had become synonymous with his name but in the darkest of nights, the whispers of his brilliant mind troubled even the fiercest of his enemies. He and his abandoned group of accomplices have lived their lives with the fates murdering any hope that dared cross them, with the world breaking them until there wasn't much left to live for but survival. A family born under such circumstances that one murmurs prayers for their well-being in the middle of the night as the promises of 'just one more chapter' lay forgotten till sunrise.


It's a sprawling epic tale with six main characters, five points of view, intricate and rich world-building that flows effortlessly into the story, flashbacks to the characters' pasts, and a magnificent blend of horror, magic, action, humor, and romance. Bardugo lovingly and sensitively creates each of her characters, allowing them to be cunning, wicked at times, and unlikable in that multi-layered way that makes them entirely appealing. Inej, the girl who never gave up, who never forgot the true meaning of loyalty. Jesper, who strives to overcome the voices in his head that plot his downfall. The Grisha Witch, Nina Zenik, who never fails to show us how to save ourselves, and the Fjerdan who learns to love when it had been wrought out of him at a young age. And at least, we have Wylan, who finally finds a home within this puzzle of a crew.

They must first break into a heavily-guarded prison and smuggle a convict out, then attempt to break into the Ice Court - a location that has never been penetrated - all in order to obtain a large sum of money. But every one of these characters has their own personal motivations, and I believe the use of third person in Six of Crows was extremely effective. It allows us to see all of these personalities on an equal footing while also allowing us to be shocked on a regular basis. With unpredictable plot twists on every corner of this book, there's no room for boredom. You don't only enjoy the captivating plot, you learn from it, crave the sequel as if it was a lifeline, one you can't live without. These characters were unlike any that I have ever met, and unlike any, I thought I would fall in love with.

"You can only sharpen a blade so far," Kaz said as he joined them at the front of the church. "In the end, it comes down to the quality of the metal." In the end, one gets hooked on the very essence of this book.
